Excerpt from Juvenal and Persius, Vol. 1 of 2: Literally Translated, With Copious Explanatory Notes Decimus Junius Juvenal was born at Aquinum, a town of the Volsci, a people of Latium: hence, from the place of his birth, he was called Aquinas. It is not certain whether he was the son, or foster-child, of a rich freedman. He had a learned education, and, in the time of Claudius Nero, pleaded causes with great reputation. About his middle age he applied himself to the study of Poetry; and, as he saw a daily increase of vice and folly, he addicted himself to writing Satire: but, having said something (sat. vii.1. 88 - 92.) which was deemed a reflection on Paris the actor, a minion of Domitian s, he was banished into Egypt, at eighty years of age, under pretence of sending him as captain of a company of soldiers. This was looked upon as a sort of humourous punishment for what he had said, in making Paris the bestower of posts in the army. However, Domitian dying soon after, Juvenal...
