The play, written by New England-born, Harvard-educated, Royall Tyler was timely, funny, and extremely popular. Did the American colonists' rejection of monarchy in 1776 mean they should abolish all European social traditions and hierarchies? Tyler was not the only American pondering these questions, and Kierner situates the play in its broader historical and cultural contexts.
